And on top of that, one thing that is very characteristic of my courses is the use of "real" everyday language from day one.




[As much as I like Forrest Gump, I would never like to train my students to speak like him]

Unlike most courses that simplify what students listen to, to make it more digestible, especially at beginning levels, I prefer to develop activities that prepare students to understand the real-fast paced type of speech that people use in real life...

.... and yes, I do this from day 1 and it works like a charm.

Let me give you a quick example of what I am talking about, but for people who want to learn English.

[Note: Phil is a great teacher, and he has great lessons, just that this one is definitely not my cup of tea. In my experience, this type of simplification causes more harm than good preparing learners for a reality that does NOT exist beyond the classroom. Just imagine someone coming to you talking like that in English!]

I am 100% convinced that the sooner you expose the learner to real language, the faster they will understand real people, even if it may be a bit hard at first.

As ludicrous as this may sound in English, strangely enough, when it comes to learning Spanish, almost all language courses sound like this and students don't even notice this. Of course, it is not their native language and it even seems common sense to expect people to speak slowly at first. After all, they are just "beginning", they will get it some time later.

In the same way as that way of talking in English may sound outright ridiculous to you, the same happens when it comes to Spanish. You need to learn "The Real Thing", not simplified materials.

They say that a picture is worth a thousand words, so I hope that a video can clear this up even better.
